ODE has joined other state agencies to form the Ohio Anti-Harassment, Anti-Intimidation and Anti-Bullying (Anti-HIB) Initiative. They are sponsoring a series of one-hour webinars during the current school year.

Everyone is encouraged to participate in each session, which will cover topics including: policy implementation and supports; cyber safety; legal ramifications; school-wide interventions; teen dating violence prevention; and girl aggression. ODE, speakers will represent the Attorney General, eTech Ohio, Ohio Domestic Violence Network and departments of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services Health, and Mental Health.

Each webinar is open to the first 100 participants, with registration open 30 minutes before each program. National Latin officer

WHS senior Samantha Buck is the first in Westlake's Latin program to be elected to a national office within the Junior Classical League. At the conclusion of this summer's National Convention at Eastern Kentucky University, Buck took over as national parliamentarian, voted in by Latin students from around the country.

States compete in academic, artistic and athletic competitions during the annual convention. Buck will travel to North Carolina this fall to attend a planning meeting for the next national convention at Wake Forest University. As parliamentarian she is responsible for revising the organization's constitution, helping state parliamentarians write and amend their constitutions, and looking for candidates to run next year.

Buck has already served as the Ohio Junior Classical League president.

Target grant for math/reading

Hilliard Elementary Intervention Specialist Christina Meecha's proposal to create a combined math and Language Arts program has earned a \$2,000 grant from Target for math literacy materials.

Meecha plans to create a library of books that deal specifically with math concepts and will be used to "grab students' attention" for math lessons for preschool through fourth grade. Meecha said many students struggle with math but love reading, so finding books that enforce a greater love of math can help students in a fun way.

Meecha said she expects 500 students will be served by the program.

Skyping interest in technology

Technology teacher Kurt Thonnings coordinated a Skype conference between a 7th grade technology class and WHS Technology/Engineering teacher Scott Kutz's students, who demonstrated software they use to create their award-winning home designs.

Additional connections will be coordinated between the LBMS and WHS students to encourage the younger students to become engineers/architects/designers and to reinforce the connection between the middle school and high school technology programs.

WHS students earn AP Scholar Awards

Two recent WHS graduates qualified for the National AP Scholar Award. Abhi Ramachandran and Arit Umana each earned an average score of 4 or higher on the 5-point AP exam scale. Qualifiers each took eight or more AP tests.

The College Board's Advanced Placement program offers students college-level courses while still in high school, and the ability to earn college credit, advanced placement or both for successful performance on the AP exams.

Ramachandran and Umana also qualified for a State AP Scholar Award. That award is given to a boy and girl from each state with the highest average score on all AP tests. Westlake's average AP exam score was 4.6.

Nineteen 2011 graduates earned an average of at least 3.5 on all AP exams taken to earn the AP Scholar with Distinction Award. WHS seniors Kyle Lathem and Joseph Warner also earned awards.

Another 13 students earned AP Scholar with Honor Awards.
