11th Excellent state report card

For the 11th consecutive year, the Westlake City School District has achieved the highest rating from the Ohio Department of Education.

Westlake achieved an "Excellent with Distinction" on the "2009 State and Local Report Card.

The Ohio report cards use multiple measures in rating each district. Based on the Westlake Schools' performance in the 2008-09 school year, this year's report card shows the district meeting 30 out of 30 performance indicators, attained its highest Performance Index Score to date of 106.3, in addition to meeting federal Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) and Value Added targets.

That Excellence was recognized at the Sept. 28 Board of Education

meeting when state Rep.

Nan Baker presented a proclamation to the Board recognizing the district's 11th consecutive Excellent report card from the ODE. The proclamation

was signed by Baker and Ohio House of Representatives speaker Armond Budish. The proclamation recognizes the hard work of our teaching staff, the fact that each school building earned an Excellent rating and the highest Performance Index Score to date.

20/20 group finalizing facilities plan

The work of drafting a master facilities plan for the Westlake City School District entered its 22nd month on Oct. 7 when a newly expanded 20/20 Vision Committee met to begin the process of finalizing a plan.

For almost two years the Westlake Schools have been compiling data, seeking feedback and preparing a master facilities plan to address aging and outdated school buildings. The biggest challenges include the capacity of the buildings and serious building systems matters.

Last fall the initial 24-member 20/20 Vision Committee met to analyze data, prioritize plans and debate strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats. The group strongly agreed there was a problem that needed to be addressed

Westlake part of ‘green’ pilot

The Westlake City School District is one of three Northeast Ohio school districts that has volunteered for the Green Schools Pilot program through the Green Schools Action Council.

The Council is a program supported by the Northeast Ohio chapter of the U.S. Green Building Coalition. As a pilot district, Westlake will gain a better understanding of the cost savings associated with green build-

ing strategies, have access to information resources and consultations and networking opportunities with other pilot districts to share best practices and find solutions to common challenges.

The program specifically will look at incorporating LEED principles into new school buildings, making existing school buildings more green, identifying maintenance practices to maximize green building benefits

and using sustainability strategies to impact school curriculum.

Westlake was approached about the project through Citizens Advisory Committee member Laura Steinbrink, who was on a subcommittee that looked at green options, WHS graduate Emily Baunach of Brown-Flynn architects in Highland Heights and Westlake resident Lisa Peterson of Burt, Hill architects in Cleveland.

It's flu season: Wash your hands

With flu season upon us, it is important to remind everyone about the Center for Disease Control's guidance promoting good hygiene and taking precautions against illness.

The flu, as well as the H1N1 virus, has surfaced in our community and school system. Aside from our normal cleaning schedule, we are taking extra reasonable precautions, including disinfecting doorknobs, computer keyboards/mice and desks each night.

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responsibly and soon. The group proposed two options to the Westlake Board of Education – a five-building grade-level configuration and a six-building configuration that maintained neighborhood schools.

The expanded 68-member 20/20 Vision Committee will debate the two options – as well as a third alternative proposed by MKC Associates of Mansfield, an architectural firm hired by the Board to review the district's master plan options – and come up with a single solution that best meets the needs of the students and the Westlake community.

The expanded group represents the City of Westlake, local business, civic organizations, faculty, students and the community. At the Oct. 7 meeting the group heard presentations on building assessments and master plan options. Going forward the group will discuss the scope of each plan and budget information, educational considerations, operational issues, site considerations, co-curricular considerations and funding options.

2 perfect ACTs at WHS

Westlake High School seniors Eleanor Batty and Julie Wang achieved a perfect score of 36 on the ACT college entrance and placement exam on the April testing. Nationwide, only 268 perfect scores were recorded – fewer than 1/10th of 1% of test takers.

Wang also is a National Merit semifinalist – one of about 16,000 nationwide. Wang has

the opportunity to compete for about \$35 million in National Merit scholarships that will be awarded next spring. National Merit Finalists will be announced in February.

Balanced math

In 2008, the National Mathematics Advisory Panel presented “Foundations for Success: The Final Report of the National Mathematics Advisory Panel,” which called for a balanced approach to mathematics.

The Westlake city School District collaborated with K-12 math teachers to select a math program that struck that balance by reinforcing fluency and computational skills, as well as conceptual ideas and problem solving activities.

The goal, according to Academic Resources Director Pam Griebel, is a coherent progression of mathematics.

The team looked at state indicators and built a framework for balancing all of the essential mathematical components to align instruction and create assessments to help students become proficient with state and district math standards.

The result is a K-12 math program that has the enVisionsMATH program added to our toolbox to complement the Investigations math program previously adopted by the district.

The enVisionsMATH program comes with online student editions and teacher resources, along with an array of manipulatives to make learning more fun for our students.

WHS junior earns nod from University of Notre Dame

WHS junior Kalpana Beach has verbally accepted a full athletic scholarship from the University of Notre Dame in South Bend, Ind., for basketball and track and field.

Kalpana is a 6-foot-1-inch basketball guard named First Team SWC for the past two years. She averaged 15 points, 8 rebounds and 2.5 steals as a sophomore.

In track & field she was named SWC champion in the high jump the past two years. She placed 7th in the state as a freshman, and as a sophomore she placed 2nd in the state and 4th in the nation. She holds a school record of 5 feet 10 inches in the high jump.
