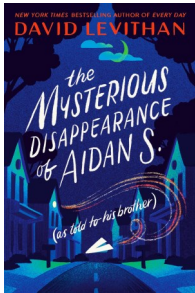




Summer Reading Suggestions

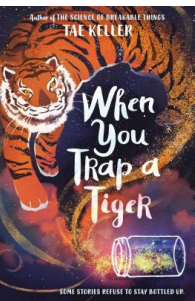
****Read whatever books you want, but here are a few good choices!****

Imagine what it would be like to spend your entire life on Mars. Amazing world building in this one!



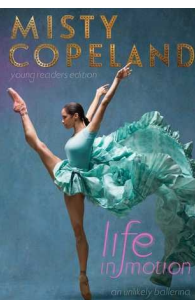

This is too complicated a fantasy book to explain in a short paragraph. But trust me—it's good! And by one of my favorite authors. :)

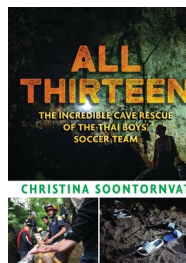
*first book in duology (series of two)



A memoir of the first African-American principal dancer in American Ballet Theater's history, a woman who is one of the best dancers and most tremendous athletes in the world.



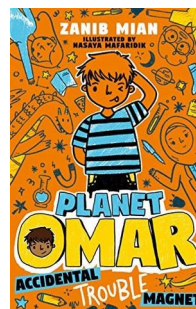
What would you do if you suddenly developed animal powers? And if the people who accidentally gave them to you want them back at all costs?



The amazing true story of how the 13 trapped soccer players were rescued from a cave before it was too late. A great book to read with your parents!

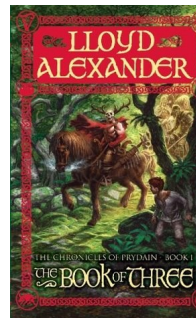
